Spring Round-Up a tool not to be overlooked

Timing is sometimes everything that is needed to make a plan successful. Following a few steps carefully can add tremendously to your youth membership and adult manpower.

We should examine first the opportunity of transition, then the new opportunity of boys not already in the program.

- 1. Transition: A successful transition occurs when each boy and his parents are asked to formally join the regular Cub dens or join Boy Scouts from Webelos. To accomplish this, one should have a ceremony for Tiger Cubs to acquaint the Tigers with customs and the organization of Cub Scouting. Don't forget to promote Lion Cubs to Tigers with a ceremony. This orientation will help clear up any ideas one may have concerning parental responsibility, plus the need to help provide leadership to the pack. Webelos, on the other hand, must begin with the boys learning who the adults are in Boy Scouting. We recommend that the Scoutmaster or his assistants be invited periodically to join in with the Cub pack activities.
- 2. Retention: Make plans to find out which leaders will remain in a leadership role. Follow up on boys that have not rechartered. Do they want to go to camp?
- 3. **Training:** The easiest way to keep the boys vou already have is to get your new and old leaders the training necessary to serve boys. Every boy deserves a trained leader. If you're not trained you're not fooling anyone, especially the boys.
- 4. Focus on Events and Programs: It's easier to recruit potential Boy Scouts when they are asked to attend something exciting like a lock-in, a camporee, a hike, swimming, or some other troop activity.
- 5. **Incentives:** Every unit should recognize its youth who recruit new boys with a gift. It could take the form of a free campout, patch, pizza
- 6. Support Materials: Flyers for distribution to schools and Sunday schools to recruit youth to your pack or troop, and online trainings including Youth Protection Training for the adults. Applications, posters, and additional help are available upon request. Call your district executive at the Scout Service Center (330-773-0415) for materials.

M & M Chair's job upsizing your troop!

We know your task as a Scoutmaster is not organizing troops, though on occasion you might be called on to help. You should, however, be vitally involved in upsizing. Before we discuss this issue, let's review some facts. First, the median troop size is 16 Scouts. Second, the quality of program increases significantly when troop size reaches 21. Our best troops (11% of the total) serve 33 or more youth. In our study of dropped troops, 71% had five or fewer adults and 78% had fewer than 16 Scouts.

How do you upsize? First of all you must be willing to move out of your comfort zone. Sit down with your troop committee, parents, or your commissioner and your new unit membership and marketing chair—someone who will help you take an honest look at your troop. Look at your program, adult leadership, and youth involvement. Determine what you need to do to serve more Scouts. There are no pat answers, because every troop in America is different. Your solution may be as easy as buying more equipment—more likely, it will involve a number of solutions.

Develop a plan for success and set some realistic goals. Bring the committee, chartered organization, parents and Scouts along for the ride. It must be the troop's plan, not your plan. Don't expect overnight success, but do set some checkpoints along the way to monitor your progress. Plan a troop celebration on the target date you set for achieving your goals. Remember that the bottom-line goal is to "deliver the promise."

Once you have the program on track, you might ask, "Where are the new Scouts?" Unfortunately, they may not be standing in line to join your troop, unless you have convinced your current Scouts to sell the program to their friends.

Is there an activity your troop does that would entice potential members? Send a letter to potential members, describing the activity and inviting them to attend. Build up the exciting, challenging aspects of the event.

Now is the time to answer the big questions, "Am I delivering the promise to the Scouts in my troop?" If your answer is no, then this is the time to begin making that promise come true.

BALOO/OWL Training on May 6



Effective January 1, 2017, the BSA National office has merged the previously separate Cub Scout BALOO and OWL trainings into a single training course! In case you're not familiar with these outdoor trainings:

BALOO = Basic Adult Leader Outdoor

Orientation; BALOO teaches the basic outdoor skills that leaders must know in order to take Cub Scouts on a campout. For every campout that a pack conducts, there must be a minimum of one BALOO trained leader in attendance.

<u>OWL</u> = <u>Outdoor Webelos Leaders Training</u>; OWL training is for leaders who will be leading a Webelos patrol. This course teaches the changes that must occur in the Webelos years in order for the boys to be ready for crossover to the Boy Scouts in addition to the more advanced outdoor skills that leaders must have to help guide that transformation. Great Minds of the 20th Century

The early 20th Century was an amazing time that effected the world we live in today. It's remarkable that ideas conceived over 100 years ago can still effect our everyday life to such an extent.

Henry Ford utilized one of these concepts when he decided to use an assembly line process to build cars. Until Mr. Ford set up his factory in a manner in which many people did one specific task in the process of building a car, it was much different. His concept changed an entire industry. His innovation made cars affordable and available to the vast majority of our population.

Around the same time new concepts were introduced by William D. Boyce, James E. West, Daniel Carter Beard, and Ernest Thompson Seton. What they had in mind was similar to Mr. Ford's concept in that many people would be involved in a process that created something that anyone could afford and enjoy. That program was the Boy Scouts of America.

Today Ford still operates on the basis of an assembly line. Many people doing specific tasks and creating a quality product. The Boy Scouts of America also still uses that same concept. Ours is not an assembly line, but it requires many people doing specific tasks to create quality products. This starts at a National level, filters down through councils and districts and eventually to the unit level. The National Council is structured on the same principles as a unit. We have similar responsibilities in both. Let's look at the Quality Control Department and the results they are seeing with our products. Are we turning out what we had hoped to?

Our product is Quality Young People who are heading out into the world to make their own way and to shape things for generations to come. Is our process working? Do we offer what is truly a value to the public? We can answer yes to these questions and we can improve in all of these areas.

Units need to fill all of the jobs that need to be done. We need to have people who are willing to do the jobs. This starts in the units with the functions of the unit committee. First, we fill the position, then we train our workforce, then we go to work. We should educate our prospective workers as to what is involved, and all of the help and education that is available to make them successful.



If we do this, then we don't scare anyone off before we start. The units that don't do this are generally those who have too few people who eventually become overwhelmed and drop out. They also don't offer the program opportunities in all areas that are the basis for creating those Quality Young People we talked about earlier.

Take some time and give your unit a good look. Do you have all of the positions filled? Are you taking advantage of the training available? Do you have too few involved who spend too many hours to offer a program? Do you know where to go for help to remedy the problems, or to ask questions? Are you willing to take the actions needed to help improve or do you even know where to start?

I can't answer these questions for you. Your unit's membership retention, number of new members, advancement, camping nights, service hours and other things tell the tale. If things in all of these areas look good, then you have a pretty good operation going. If one or more don't look so good, we need to help you get it improved. That's what your commissioner staff does. They help you improve.

Give us a call, or come talk to us at a roundtable or other event. We'd like to hear from you, and help you if you need it. Or you might help us by informing us of the needs you have that aren't yet being filled.

Thanks for being a part of our process, and for all you do in Scouting. Together we will make a huge impact on the future and I'm looking forward to working with you in accomplishing that task.
